Q1. Which command is used to draw a continuous waveform?
A2 The command most often used for plotting is plot, which creates linear plots of vectors and matrices; plot $(\mathrm{t}, \mathrm{y})$ plots the vector t on the x -axis versus vector y on the y -axis

Q2Which command is used to draw a discrete waveform?
A2 For discrete-time signals, use the command stem which plots each point with a small open circle and a straight line. To plot $\mathrm{y}[\mathrm{k}]$ versus k , type stem $(\mathrm{k}, \mathrm{y})$.

Q3. Which command is used to plot two or more graphs on the same set of axes?
A3.To plot two or more graphs on the same set of axes, use the command plot ( $\mathrm{t} 1, \mathrm{y} 1, \mathrm{t} 2, \mathrm{y} 2$ ), which plots y 1 versus t 1 and y 2 versus t 2 .

A7. To plot more than one graph on the screen, use the command subplot(mnp) which partitions the screen into an mxn grid where $p$ determines the position of the particular graph counting the upper left corner as $\mathrm{p}=1$. For example,

A8: The auto scaling of the axes can be done by using the axis command after the plotting command:
axis([xminxmaxyminymax]);
where xmin, xmax, ymin, and ymax are numbers corresponding to the limits you desire for the axes. To return to the automatic scaling, simply type axis.

The linetype options are '-' solid line (default), '--' dashed line, '-.' dot dash line, ':' dotted line. The points in y can be left unconnected and delineated by a variety of symbols: + . $^{*}$ o x. The following colors are available options:
r Red
b Blue
g Green
w White

When there is no correlation between two variables, then there is no tendency for the values of the variables to increase or decrease in tandem. Two variables that are uncorrelated are not necessarily independent, however, because they might have a nonlinear relationship.

A2 It has applications that computes and plots the sample autocorrelation function (ACF) of a univariate, stochastic time series .

A3The autocorrelation function of a random signal describes the general dependence of
the values of the samples at one time on the values of the samples at another time.

A4 The cross correlation function however measures the dependence of the values of one signal on another signal.
